We have been exchanging students from China. This was a very good step to promote closer relations with China. I suggest that we might do the same thing with Indonesia; or perhaps it would not be quite correct to say the same thing as probably there are no facilities for the education of Indian students in Indonesia at present. To begin with therefore, all we can do is to offer scholarships to some Indonesian students to study in Indian Universities. I would strongly urge upon you to take some steps in this direction and to announce. that a number of Indonesian students would be given such scholarships. Later on when facilities are available in Java some of our students should go there. I understand that Dr. Sultan Sjahrar, Prime Minister of the Indonesian Republic, would greatly welcome some such step on our behalf. This will be in a sense an informal recognition of the Indonesian Republican Government and would lead to further contacts.

2. I suggest to you, therefore, that the Education Department might make some such announcement stating further that selection of students would be left to some authority constituted in this behalf by the Indonesian Republican Government.

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

Subject: - INDIAN CULTURAL MISSION TO INDONESTA.

Sir,

I have the honour to refer you to your D.1772-FEA/48 dated 16th March 1948. I thank you for the copy of the note by Dr. N.P. Chakravarti which has been forwarded to the Indonesian authorities as directed.

I have taken up the matter of the invitation to Indian archeologists by the Republican Government. I suggest that the delegation may be styled "Indian Cultural Mission to Indonesia". The President of the Republic suggests, the latter part of May as a suitable time for the visit. I have taken up the matter with the Netherlands East Indies Government also and I have also written to the Government of East Indonesia. A copy of the reply received from the Far Eastern Office of the Netherlands Ministry of Foreign Affairs ...dated 7th April 1948 is herewith enclosed. I have not yet heard fro the Government of East Indonesia, but I feel certain, as a result of contacts during my recent trip to Celebes, Bali, etc., that the Missid would be warmly welcomed there also. In any programme or itinerary of the Mission, Bali, I am sure, will receive a special place. The people of Bali are anxiously expecting re-establishment of contacts between India and their native land. The former Raja of Singaradja, who is very much interested in cultural contacts between Bali and India left this morning for India and met me before his departure. I have given him a few letters of introduction to the Agricultures Minister of Madras, the Chief Minister of Travancore, etc. as he wished to study agriculture for two or three months at the Marthanda Institute of Agriculture in Travancore about which he had known bef I hope, while in India, he would also call at New Delhi, though his programme at present des not include a visit to our capital. He also said that he would be going across to America and Europe and returni to Bali only after a few months. |

I suggest that the Cultural Mission would include men 11 Dr. B.Ch.Chhabra, Government Epigraphist, Ootacamund, and, if possible and if he can be spared, be ledd by a persons of the eminence of Dr. S. Radhakrishnan. It is hoped that the Mission would be one of about only 4 or 5 people. Providing suitable accommodation is a difficult problem all over Indonesia, including Batavia.

I shall be obliged if I am informed early about the number, names and probable date of the arrival of the Mission in Batavia so that I may begin arranging about their. accommodation, visits and tour programmes etc. in time.

Regarding the last sentence in your letter, I am of the opinion that the time is opportune, even though political conditions are still unsettled, for the Mission to visit Indonesia. The end of May or beginning of June is quite suitable provided, of course, we are informed early enough so that arrangements here could be completed in time.
